## AUTHOR GUIDELINES

*Živopis* is a journal that has been published since 2007. The journal publishes works on multidisciplinary topics from the social sciences and humanities, narrower artistic and scientific fields, and of artistic and theological character. The journal publishes original research articles, review articles, reports, critical reviews, polemics, reviews, projects, interviews, and translations in the field of Church art and theology as well as other disciplines which support the development of Church art and accompanying theological thought. The topic is divided into three areas: Studies (from theology, art history, musicology, architecture, chemistry, physical chemistry), Arts (Church painting: iconography, fresco painting, mosaic, sculpture, etc.), and Restoration and preservation (methodology of conservation and restoration of icons on wood and canvas, frescoes, and stone buildings). The journal comes out once a year.

The decision of the editorial board to accept a certain article implies the consultation of two reviewers.

1. The journal welcomes articles written in Serbian, in Cyrillic alphabet. Articles can also be written in foreign languages. The authors are responsible for the quality of the language of the article. Therefore, authors who submit an article in a language other than their mother tongue are asked to submit the text for professional proofreading before submitting it for publication to the journal *Živopis*. Grammatically incorrect or stylistically poorly written articles will be rejected.

2. Manuscripts are submitted in WORD format, Times New Roman font, size 12, line spacing 1.5. Footnotes are in Times New Roman font, size 10, single line spacing. If the author uses some specific fonts (e.g., Church Slavonic), he is obliged to submit the used fonts.

3. It is obligatory to state: name, surname, institutional affiliation, and e-mail. In case there are several authors, provide for each author all the required information.

4. Each article should contain: Title; Abstract; Keywords; Main text; Footnotes; Summary title; Summary; Bibliography.

5. The abstract should contain no more than 300 characters; it should not contain abbreviations or references. Keywords are listed in a separate line below the abstract, maximum 5 to 7 words. Keywords must be relevant to the topic and content of the article. The abstract should be written in the language of the main text.

6. The manuscript, which includes the title, abstract, key words, main text, abstract, bibliography, as well as footnotes, should contain up to 45,000 characters. The manuscript can have chapters and subchapters. All paragraphs should be indented 0.5, and there should be no blank line to separate paragraphs. The text is submitted without pagination. Double quotation marks are used for quotations within the text, and single quotes for quotations within quotations.

QUOTATIONS SHOULD BE WRITTEN IN THE FOLLOWING WAY: „”, NOT „“, ” “, „»«, «»». WITH THE QUOTED WORKS IN A FOREIGN LANGUAGE, THE FOLLOWING

QUOTES ARE TO BE USED ” “. IF THE TEXT OF THE ARTICLE IS IN A FOREIGN LANGUAGE, THE QUOTES ” “ ARE USED FOR ALL QUOTATIONS.

7. The summary is written after the main text, before the Bibliography, and should contain up to 1200 characters. If the text is in Serbian, the abstract should be in English or another foreign language. If the text is in a foreign language, the summary should be in Serbian.

8. Bibliography is listed in alphabetical order by author's surname. More works by the same author should be listed chronologically. If the same author has published several works in the same year, include lowercase letters after the year in alphabetical order.

9. The place of the pictures and illustrations, tables, graphs, schemes in the text of the article should be specified (example: Fig.1). They are sent as separate files, accurately titled and numbered, with accompanying explanations and references to the source of the material, i.e., the name and surname of the author of the supplementary material. The text cannot contain more than 5 supplementary materials submitted in tiff. or jpg. format.

### **REPEATED QUOTATION**

a) Abbreviation Ibid. (from Ibidem – in the same place) refers to the footnote that precedes it. It replaces everything that is identical in the following footnote. If the footnote is identical to the previous one, only Ibid. can be used, but if the page number differs, then the page number to which it refers is added. Abbreviation Ibid. is not used if the footnote has more than one author, unless all the information in the following footnote is identical.

b) Abbreviated citations of the previously used literature after a break in the continuity of citation should include: Author's surname, abbreviated title of the work, and page number.

## **THE BOOKS OF THE BIBLE**

The books of the Holy Bible are not listed in the bibliography, but only in the text of the article.

Parts of the Holy Bible, verses or text references are to be cited only in the main text as follows:

Book abbreviation (according to Biblical abbreviations in the text below), chapter number, comma and verse/verses number. Example: (Exodus 14, 8 or 1 Cor 4, 37).

If more separate verses from the same chapter are quoted, they should be separated by a full stop.

Example: (Gen. 18, 2-6.14-16.20).

If the author refers to the succeeding verses thereafter, he should use the abbreviation "vv".

Example: (Jer 20, 8vv – the succeeding verses) or just "v" (Jn 17, 7c – the succeeding verse).
